Joel P. Martin stood in front of a roomful of judges and lawyers and the energy was off.

As president of Triad West, a Valley executive coaching business, and former player in the New York advertising scene, she was used to reading a room. The energy in this room was low and uninspired.

Martin asked: "How many of you give to yourself as much as you give to others?"

Only one hand went up.

That prompted Martin to found the Positively Powerful Women Awards four years ago. Three to five entrepreneurial Valley women, many founders of non-profits, are celebrated for the work they do and "treated like queens," the 67-year-old Scottsdale resident said.

"There is value in giving to oneself," she said. "How can you be a light for others if you let your own candle go out?"

Martin calls herself a breast cancer "conqueror" instead of survivor and says that she grew up in a church where contributing to one's community was expected.

This explains one reason Martin volunteers for numerous groups, including the Scottsdale Human Relations Commission, the Coalition of Blacks Against Breast Cancer, American Baptist Homes of the West, American Homes and Services for the Aging, and the Minority Business Enterprise Input Committee of the Grand Canyon Minority Supplier Developer Council.

But there is another reason that after only 10 years in the Valley, Martin continues to be involved in so many volunteer projects: "It lights my candle. I'm a passionate advocate for women. I love to see them win."
